



THOMAS MUNSON FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIP FUND AWARDS

INSTRUCTIONS

The Thomas Munson Foundation Scholarship Fund (TMFSF) provides scholarships for accredited community or junior college and vocational and technical schools; four-year college or university; and graduate studies.

Detailed descriptions of all scholarships, including eligibility requirements and performance metrics for renewable scholarships, are given below on pages 7–9.

There is no fee to apply for a TMFSF internship.

To apply, you must be a citizen of the United States and must be able to trace your ancestry to Thomas Munson or another original settler of the colony at New Haven, Connecticut, in 1639. Information about documenting your descent lineage and a complete list of the settlers is given below on pages 10–11.

As an applicant, you are solely responsible for ensuring that all application materials are postmarked or submitted electronically on or before the deadline. For electronic submissions, use our website, www.thomasmunson.org. For postal submissions, address your materials to:

The deadline for scholarship application materials is March 1, 2023. Applications and materials postmarked or submitted electronically on or after March 2 will not be considered.

Applicants may address questions about application instructions to the Scholarship Awards Chairperson, Mr. Dave Weaver, at tmfsfawards@thomasmunson.org.

If you mail your application materials, bear in mind that delivery confirmation is not provided. Use a United States Postal Service (USPS) delivery option with tracking if you want confirmation.

Each applicant must ensure that all required academic institution documents/transcripts and letters of recommendation are either postmarked or submitted electronically by the deadline. Be vigilant and insistent, and make timely inquiries with the school(s) and individuals from whom you request documents and letters so that they send the materials by the deadline.

Decisions of the Scholarship Awards Committee are final.

Decision letters are mailed in the spring. If you are awarded a scholarship, our treasurer will send the funds to you.

We welcome your application and will consider it carefully. Good luck!

To Assemble Your Application Package

- 1 Complete the Application that follows. All questions must be answered and essays written, including the Personal Statement and Historical Context Question. You must agree to, sign, and date the Honor Pledge. Read the Application carefully for complete information.
- 2 The following documents must be (1) mailed directly by original sources, not the applicant, unless they arrive enclosed in a sealed and unopened envelope or (2) uploaded by original sources electronically at our website, www.thomasmunson.org. If your sources send materials electronically, ask them to give the documents a name that begins with your name, for example: **janemunson_transcript_fromellensmith.pdf** or **johnturner.letter.fromjanedoe.docx**. Provide your sources with your email address, so they can let you know they received an auto-reply confirming their electronic submission.
 - A signed letter of recommendation from a school official (classroom teacher, counselor, faculty member, faculty advisor, or institution administrator). S/he must provide complete contact information.
 - A signed letter of recommendation from a community member who is not related to you. S/he must provide complete contact information.
 - A good copy or the original copy of your high school and college transcript(s), depending on the scholarship you are applying for. Transcripts should name the courses completed and grades earned, including mid-term grades for the current scholastic year.
 - Evidence of ancestry. If you are a descendant of Thomas Munson, apply for an RN number as directed on page 4. Descendants of other New Haven signers should follow the instructions on pages 10–11 for submitting evidence of ancestry.

Failure to follow the directions may result in your application being disqualified.

Print out the application. Legibly print or type all information. If submitting by U.S. Postal Service, purchase tracking if you want delivery confirmation. If submitting electronically, scan your completed application and upload it as a PDF on www.thomasmunson.org.

- Thomas Munson left the known world of England for a new life in what would become the United States. In what way have you taken a chance or tried something new to achieve a goal that is important to you?

SCHOLARSHIP DESCRIPTIONS

1. 2-Year Community or Junior College Renewable Scholarship (\$2,500)

Purpose: To help pay the costs of community or junior college. Community or junior college includes accredited U.S. community and junior colleges. Career, technical, vocational, and trade schools will also be considered.

Eligibility: An applicant must be able to trace his or her ancestry to Thomas Munson or another original settler of the colony at New Haven, Connecticut, in 1639. Applicants must be applying to enter a college or school as described above (Purpose).

Target applicants: Motivated individuals of any age who wish to pursue higher education and who will complete the degree within the continuous 2-year time frame.

Amount: \$2,500/year with second-year renewal based on performance metrics. Renewability will be evaluated based on performance metrics as well as the awardee's demonstrated commitment to achieving his/her academic goals.

Renewal performance metrics: 1) Achieve cumulative 3.0 GPA for the first year, as verified by an official transcript sent to the Scholarship Awards Committee Chairperson by July 1 following Spring Semester completion. If awardee falls below the 3.0 GPA threshold, s/he has 1 semester grace period to raise the cumulative GPA back to 3.0. The scholarship will stay in place and will be paid for the grace period semester. If, however, the 3.0 GPA threshold is not achieved at the end of the grace period semester, the scholarship will be forfeited going forward. 2) Submit a written report to the Scholarship Awards Committee Chairperson also by July 1 following Spring Semester completion that a) details in 100 to 150 words the awardee's academic accomplishments, b) explains in 100 to 150 words the awardee's positive personal growth experiences for the first year, and c) describes in 100 to 150 words the awardee's career path and job opportunity targets and/or offers received based on program achievements. Failure to progress toward the degree within the time frame will be taken into consideration by reviewers in deciding whether to renew the award.

Deadline: March 1

2. 4-Year College or University Renewable Scholarships (\$5,000)

Purpose: To help students pay for college or university.

Eligibility: An applicant must be able to trace his or her ancestry to Thomas Munson or another original settler of the colony at New Haven, Connecticut, in 1639. Applicants must be applying to enter a 4-year program of any major or discipline at an accredited college or university. Applicants can be current high school seniors, undergraduate freshmen, sophomores, or juniors enrolled in any undergraduate major of an accredited 4-year college or university; these applicants may apply for renewable annual awards for their remaining program years.

Target applicants: Motivated individuals of any age who wish to pursue higher education and who will complete the degree within the continuous 4-year time frame.

Amount: \$5,000/year with second- to fourth-year renewals based on performance metrics. Renewability will be evaluated based on performance metrics as well as the awardee's demonstrated commitment to achieving his/her academic goals.

Renewal performance metrics: 1) Achieve cumulative 3.0 GPA for each scholarship award year, as verified by an official transcript sent to the Scholarship Awards Committee Chairperson by July 1 following Spring Semester completion. If awardee falls below the 3.0 GPA threshold, s/he has 1 semester grace period to raise the cumulative GPA back to 3.0. The scholarship will stay in place and will be paid for the grace period semester. If, however, the 3.0 GPA threshold is not achieved at the end of the grace period semester, the scholarship will be forfeited going forward. 2) Submit a written report to the Awards Committee Chairperson also by July 1 following Spring Semester completion that a) details in 100 to 150 words your academic accomplishments for the year, b) illustrates in 100 to 150 words at least one academic goal you achieved in your major that will further your career opportunities, and c) explains in 100 to 150 words one or more positive personal growth experiences for the award year. For the final renewal year, the written report must describe how you will seek and secure employment in your chosen career or what your next life steps will be upon completion of the undergraduate program. If you have secured employment before graduation, include in your final scholarship report where you will be working and what your job activities and responsibilities will be. Failure to progress toward the degree within the time frame will be taken into consideration by reviewers in deciding whether to renew the award.

Number of awards: 4

Deadline: March 1

3. One Graduate Program Scholarship (\$5,000)

Purpose: To help a student pay for graduate school.

Eligibility: An applicant must be able to trace his or her ancestry to Thomas Munson or another original settler of the colony at New Haven, Connecticut, in 1639. Applicants must be applying for or currently enrolled in an accredited masters or doctoral graduate program of any major or discipline, or a professional program such as law school, engineering school, or medical school. This award is not renewable.

Target applicants: Graduating college/university seniors or individuals with a completed undergraduate degree from an accredited college or university.

Amount: \$5,000

Number of awards: 1

Deadline: March 1



DOCUMENTING YOUR DESCENT FROM A SIGNER OF THE 1639 NEW HAVEN COMPACT

You do not need to be descended from Thomas Munson or related to a member of the Thomas Munson Foundation to apply for a scholarship.

Descent from Thomas Munson:

To document your descent from Thomas Munson, begin your research well in advance of the application deadline.

If you are already registered in the database of Thomas Munson descendants and/or *The Munson Record*, enter your clan name and RN number on page 4 of the application; no further documentation of your descent is needed. Do not enter the number from a Thomas Munson Foundation membership card. It is not an RN number and not a substitute for one.

If you do not have an RN number or do not know if you are registered in the database, email Mr. Melvyn Douglass, President of the Thomas Munson Foundation, for assistance at President@thomasmunson.org. In the subject line of your email, write "Request for Genealogy Assistance." You will receive a reply asking for information. Do not wait until the deadline is near to request assistance. When you receive your RN number, enter it on your application.

If you elect to do your own genealogy research instead of requesting assistance, with your application send (1) a copy of your birth certificate and (2) unassailable documentation that establishes your descent from a clan on the Thomas Munson family tree. To research your own genealogy, try Google searches or look for information on a genealogy website. Some public libraries allow patrons to access genealogy sites at no charge. Submit complete documentation. We may ask you to provide additional information and birth certificates.

Descent from another signer of the 1639 New Haven compact:

If you are descended from a signer of the 1639 FUNDAMENTAL AGREEMENT FOR GOVERNANCE OF NEW HAVEN COLONY other than Thomas Munson, you are eligible to apply for a scholarship, provided you document your descent from your ancestor, send a copy of your birth certificate, and meet all the other application criteria. We may ask you to provide additional information and birth certificates. The following page lists all the signatories to the 1639 Fundamental Agreement document.
